

About the Centre for Child and Family Justice Research


- The Centre is a partnership between Department of Sociology & the Law School, working closely with the Data Science Institute

Why this seminar? Centre work on inequality

- Unequal chances of becoming involved in the child protection and family justice system is a strong theme in a number of Centre projects
- Housing and material deprivation is part of the story
- All create an added burden on family life and reinforce inequality
- Regional variation
