Care-experienced Mothers in the Criminal Justice System: Challenges (I)

- Unnecessary criminalisation of children in care
- Stigma and labelling
 - Negative assumptions about care-experienced individuals
 - Gendered judgements
- Mistrust of systems





Care-experienced Mothers in the Criminal Justice System: Challenges (II)

- Access to leaving care services
- Lack of support after child removal
- Emotional impacts
 - Fear
 - Anger
 - Shame





Care-experienced Mothers in the Criminal Justice System: Possibilities

- Moving beyond official records
- Challenging stigma
- Building trusting relationships
- Identification and disclosure
